

Martin County Commissioners

- Commissioners are elected for a four-year term
- Terms are staggered so there are always experienced commissioners. Districts 1, 3, and 5 are elected in presidential years. Districts 2 and 4 are elected in non-presidential years.
- Commissioner races are partisan
- There are 5 geographic districts in the county numbered one to five
- Commissioners are elected at large. While the 5 commissioners must reside in and represent specific geographic districts, they are elected by a county-wide vote, meaning all voters in Martin County vote for each of the five commissioners.
- Elections for commissioners usually take place in the Primary election. However, if a political party has more than one candidate running for a commissioner's seat and there is a candidate from another party also running, then the Primary determines each party's candidate and the election for that seat will take place in the General Election.
- **Stacey Hetherington** and **Sarah Heard** are the two Republican commissioners facing re-election in the August 2026 primary.
- Former mayor **Chris Collins** is up against Stacey Hetherington for District 2.
- **John Kazanjian** and **John Dial** (both Republicans) are running against Sarah Heard for District 4.
- Qualifying period for commissioners begins June 8, 2026 and ends June 12, 2026
